Once you insert the game catridge into your dusty ol' SNES, turn on the power. You should eventually come to a sign. Press Start to advance to the title screen; press it again to come to the start-up ATM menu.

Here, you can "reload a file" by inputting a password into the "Quickashier"
part, then clicking on the button next to "Enter Password". If you do not have a password, click on "New Account", input a name, read some stuff, then write down the password given. Said password may change - please note this.

And so, you can begin play. A new account will start with $\$ 2,000$ and no high roller status.
 Begin by making your bet, placing it, and pressing Y.

You and dealer each get two cards. Your two are shown; only one of the dealer's is. Your goal is to get to 21 or as close to it as possible. You do so by adding the values of your cards, as shown below.


If you have a 10 -value card and an Ace at the start, you get a Blackjack, which is famous in casinos for the saying "Winner, winner, chicken dinner." But, all kidding aside, your total payoff is $2.5 x$ the original bet (where your profit is equal to $1.5 x$ the original bet).

If you or the dealer go over $21(22+)$, the one who went over (busted) loses.

Otherwise, after you receive both cards, press $L$ to stay with what you have (stand), or press $R$ to get another card (hit). The dealer, who cannot hit above 18, I think, will then deal his hand. Whoever doesn't bust or the one with the best hand wins. If you win, you get a profit equal to your bet.

You also have the option to double. In doing so, you need to put a bet less than or equal to your initial bet next to your original bet. This gives you one card and one card only. The dealer deals his hand, etc. If you win, both bets
receive the correct amount of money. If you lose, you lose both bets.

If you end up with two equal-value cards, you can play two hands at once. Do so by placing a bet equal to your original bet about one inch to the right of the initial bet. The hand splits into two other two-card hands. You may split once more if desired/possible. Each hand plays separately and is not affected by the others.

If the dealer shows an Ace, you may buy insurance (I rarely do). To do so, you place a bet less than or equal to ONE HALF of your original bet on the insurance line. If the dealer does have blackjack, the insurance is paid $2: 1$. If not, you lose that bet and the hand continues as previously described.

For once, $I$ can give tips:

- Whenever the dealer shows a card, assume the other is a 10-value, as it is four times more likely to be such versus other cards.
- Never buy insurance. Out of the 13 other possible cards (not counting suits), 9/13 (~69.23\%) will not deal blackjack.
- Never split 10's. Always splits Aces and 8's.
- If you know the counting cards technique, don't use it. Too much is unknown, after all.
 Red Dog is a game of "in-between". Begin by placing down your bet and pressing Y.

Two cards will show up. Your goal is to have a card in-between these numbers. Once the first two cards are shown, you may double (bet an amount less than or equal to your first bet by placing it next to the initial bet) if you want to. A third card is dealt. If it is between the first two in value, you win. If not, you lose.

Here are some odds for winning, in case if you are curious. All percentages are rounded to four decimal places (the nearest ten-thousandth). Aces are ones, Jacks are elevens, Queens are twelves, and Kings are thirteens. Differences are calculated using absolute value (if it is negative, it becomes positive).





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 Roulette is a game of luck, in which you bet that, on a roll of one number out of thirty-eight, your bet will satisfy on of the conditions on the board.

To place a bet, find a coin you wish to bet by pressing A, press B over the coin, then press B over the desired destination. You can make multiple bets. Press Y to begin.

Here is an chance system denoting which bets have which the chance of being right on a fair basis. Please note that all percentages are rounded to the nearest one-thousandth of a percent.




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For most of the bet-related stuff, the game says to refer to the game manual. Greeeat... I didn't get the manual, and I doubt you did. However, I would accept any info you can provide; see contact info in the Legalities section.

Anyhow, place a bet on some sections. Press $Y$ to begin. If your money is on the Pass/Don't Pass lines, you roll. (Press B twice to do so.) Losing bets are removed and winning ones, paid.

Here is some more information, with credits going to the Microsoft Encarta Encyclopedia 2005 Edition, ウ 1993-2004 Microsoft Corporation.
"In play, dice are thrown from the player's hand or from a dice cup, and the total number of dots showing on the top of the dice at rest determines the value of the throw. The most popular dice game in the United States is craps, a form of the old English game of hazard. It is played with two dice. In craps the thrower makes a money bet that is covered by one or more opponents. If the first throw totals 7 or 11, the player wins, but if 2, 3, or 12 is thrown, the player loses. In any of these cases betting and throwing are repeated. If the throw totals 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 , that number becomes the player's point, and throwing is continued until the same point is made again or a 7 is thrown. If the point is made, the player wins, but if a 7 is thrown, the player loses both the bet and the right to throw again."
 Firstly, move to the lower part of the machine. Move your hand over the coin slot and deposit some coins by pressing B - you must insert 1 to 5 coins. The game begins upon either clicking "Deal" or inserting all five coins.

The goal is to create certain kinds of hands within two draws. You are shown a certain hand. If you want to keep cards from this hand, click the "Hold" button underneath those you wish to keep. Press "Deal" to get the second hand and any winnings you may have received.

Here is the scoring system:

When you find the machine, go down from the scoring menu to find the machine itself. Insert some coins into the machine by going to the coin slot and pressing B. You can have up to three coins of the value shown. Pull the arm down by hovering the cursor on the right side of the machine and pressing $B$.

There are two different machines: the Champion variety, and the Home Run one.

In Champion, you have the following score system:



The following score system is for Home Run:

The true game of luck. Begin by going to the dollar values in the corner and selecting whichever value ticket you'd prefer - this is how much it costs. Then take to the grid and begin to cross off numbers.

Click "Done" to finish. You may buy multiple tickets. The results of the drawing are shown later on.

Here's the thing: there are $331,474,010,868$ combinations of ten numbers. Not too good, no matter HoW MANY must match to win.
 Firstly, you must place a bet. Select "Single Bets" to make a bet based on a win, place, or show bets. The horses of the current race are displayed as are their odds.

ABOUT ODDS: Say the odds are \#:1. The greater \# is, the less likely it is that this horse wins; however, the payoff will also be greater.

After selecting a horse, you can place a place, win, or show bet on it. Select "Done/Exit" to finalize your bets.

You can also make some exotic bets by selecting a Quiniella or Trifecta race from the Type-Of-Bet secreen. A Quiniella is on two horses that you select, and you win if the selected horses come in either first or second place. Trifecta bets are for three horses finishing in the chosen order.

RANDOM TRIVIA: "Quin-" is a prefix for "five" sometimes, too. Hm.

You can also see horse stats by selecting "View Stats" from the main option screen. You can look at the stats for one of the four horses shown.

Using "View Races", you can see the results of past races.

Regardless of what happens, two things always apply to horse betting...

- You cannot make bets during a race, even if you haven't betted in said race.
- You will be told of the results later on, with you being paid off if it is so applicable.

13. ATM Stuff**************************SCP13

Firstly, while in the ATM, you can set up another account, similarly to how you started. Hit the button next to "New Account", enter a name, and you soon get a password. You can also reload an old account - simply enter the password into the "Quickashier" section. To get another password for current progress in an account, use the "Password/Exit" option.

Additionally, you can also check your current balance, as well as play some scratchers for $\$ 100$ a pop. They are described below:

- 60-Yard Fight: Here, you are to scratch off one section of the six rows, bottom to top. You get the money uncovered, which will go up as you proceed. However, as you proceed, more bombs appear, which means you have more of a chance of losing. There is one on the first section, two on the second, and so on.
- Match Two: Here, you simply uncover number values (ranging from $\$ 25$ to $\$ 2,500$ I think) until you match two. You then receive that amount in money. However, if you uncover a bomb before doing so, you lose!
- Triple Jacks: Here, you uncover card representations in order to first get a hand higher than the dealer's. Then you can continue play to try to get one of the combinations in the top-right corner. You will lose upon uncovering a bomb, though!

When you lose or meet the minimum requirements, you can press B to uncover the whole card (loss only) or press Select to collect your current winnings.


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
